SHAW BROUGHT BACK TO HUB

Dodges Questions Which Would Tend to Incriminate Him

Boston, March 23,-Arthur W. Bhaw, under indictment in this city, charged with larceny of \$19,000 from the A. W. Shaw corporation of Freeport. Me., declared that he had known Mrs. Georgia Stuart since she was a girl, that she was still a friend of his, and that he was sorry she was in trouble on his account.

Shaw, who was very nervous after his ride from Los Angeles, which city he left Monday morning in the custody of Captain Armstrong and Inspector clear him before the public.

He had been grilled by the officers in an effort to have him make a clean breast of the charges made against him, but Shaw sidestepped all questions which would tend to incriminate by his counsel in Los Angeles not to make any statement to the officers or Boston counsel.
